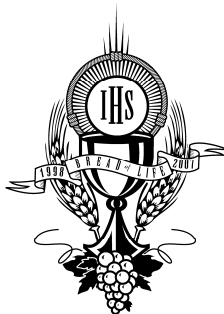

SOCIAL JUSTICE CORNER

The basic message of the Christian churches is about the love of God, and there are two characteristics about the love of God: One is gratuity. God loves people without conditions. Take the story of the prodigal son, who comes back home to find that his father is there, waiting for him. The son has his little negotiating speech ready, but he doesn't have to use it. The son is just welcomed—that is gratuity, going beyond what is expected or necessary. The other is superabundance. The love of God surprises you—it is so generous that it turns you head over heels. These two values stand in opposition to a market-driven consumer society in which everything is precisely measured out. If the label says 16 ounces, you won't get an ounce more. If we truly lived in an environment like this, where you got only what you paid for and nothing beyond, none of us would be where we are today. The world needs these values that create generosity; that make you care about another person even if the person is weak; that motivate you to make a huge investment in a person. The economy will attain its role if it is complimented by effective government, but also by a society with a heart and with generosity. This last will be needed more and more in hard times.—*Reflects on Lessons Learned From Financial Crisis* by Archbishop Diarmuid Martin. DEDICATION OF ST. JOHN LATERAN BASILICA

When our family traveled to visit relatives, certain places along the way took on special significance. Landmarks, hamburger stands and rest areas marked the distance. But the most important places were old buildings where great grandparents had been employed or homes where my parents grew up. Many years later, these places still hold a special significance because of the people who once were there.

St. John Lateran is a special place in the life of the Church. It is the Cathedral of Rome, the church that houses the Chair of Peter. So many significant events took place here: treaties signed, religious orders began, and Papal pronouncements made. The décor is magnificent, with towering statues of the Apostles and over each one, a painting of a prophet, a reminder that the church is founded on the apostles and martyrs. The Lateran has a Latin inscription on the façade that reads in part: the head and mother church of all the churches of the city and the world.

In the Church's journey of faith, this is one of the special landmarks. We honor St. John Lateran for its unique role in the life and mission of the Church. 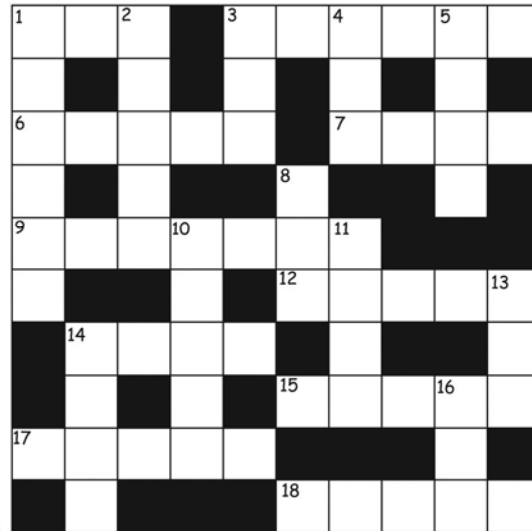
